### RESEARCH #1

- = Brainstorm & develop initial Big Idea HOW?
- Mindmap
- Use your own brain WHAT?
- Use Bible
- Use dictionaries (word meaning)
- Use specific encyclopaedias

### RESEARCH #2

- = General reading & note taking to expand Big Idea & write structure HOW?
- Read generally = overview , ski, & scan
- Take notes generally = simple structure, colour, summary sentence & why important WHAT?
- Good encyclopaedias
- Good textbooks / surveys still general (browse relevant shelves, returns)
- Simple relevant books = Search catalogue / lecturer's recommendations (TOCs/ indexes)
- Specific detailed books = Search catalogue
- Specific detailed articles (EBSCO & ProQuest)
- Complete Big Idea & write structure

# Writing 1 = Detailed notes HOW?

- Detailed read of your research
- Collect detailed notes
   According to your structure
   WHAT?
- One electronic file with HEADINGS according to your structure, which is according to your Bif Idea


## Keyterms & Subject Headings Here's how you do it..... REVISE

- 1. Analyse the qn & brainstorm find keywords for search
- 2. Choose keywords to commence search
  - how many hits did you get?
- 3. Skim the search list Look at a couple of "GOOD" results and a "BAD" result
  (in "address" detail)
  - See potential "Subject Headings" to use click these.
  - Limit or expand if necessary
- 4. Try different keyword and repeat 1-3.
- 5. Record all the "subject headings" you want to search further, or even together, next





# How to search in a database b. Boolean searching

- ❖ AND / OR / NOT
- Must be in CAPITALS
- "Nest word phrases" eg "Gender issues" AND...
- \* \* = "anything after this letter"
- ? = spelling uncertainties
- Nest combinations
  Eg ("Gender issues" AND Christianity)
  NOT "Gender identity"

- ❖ PDF vs HTML

- The order of applying limits
- Every database is different
